South Africa's economy is declining, but unemployment rate has inclined over the last few years due to issues like corruption.

The country's unemployment rate, which stood at a frightening 28,74 percent in 2020, was designated as one of the highest worldwide.

This is due, in large part, to the Corona Virus pandemic which has had a substantial influence on the country's economy since March 2020, prompting several enterprises to liquidate and retrench some of their employees to remain afloat.

This happened due to the frequent lockdowns to try and reduce the transmission of the virus, conveyed through physical and social contact. These lockdowns, on the other hand, have had a huge strain on our economy as revenue and profit production came to a standstill. Many were left jobless and in grave financial problems.

The economic strains our country faced did not only affect the older working generation, but also the youth. Upon the negative impact of the virus, securing employment has become an almost impossible mission for graduates and post-graduates.

Graduates are placed in dire



predicaments, leading to homelessness and poverty. Unemployment has been shown to cause significant stress and discouragement amongst graduates and post-graduates.

Tamara Wildskut, a Nelson Mandela University Education Student and post Funza-Lushaka supported graduate says "I suffered significantly with obtaining a job upon my graduation in 2020."

"I personally believe that the Funza bursary should prioritize its graduates when seeking for job opportunities in governmental jobs, as I did, since this can help battle youth unemployment in a small but useful way." The unemployment rate is now approximately 35.80%, as many students continue to struggle with finding work, yet nothing continues to be done.

During emergencies, and for those who require long-term treatment, your blood could be a life saver. Blood donation is critical for people undergoing surgery, suffering from chronic diseases, cancer treatment, and those affected by catastrophic injuries. The demand for blood is constant yet barely 3 percent of persons who are age eligible donate blood annually. Blood donors provide vital services to the community. Thousands of patients would die daily if there were insufficient quality blood. According to the American Red Cross, donating one unit may save the lives of up to three people.

The South African National Blood Service (SANBS) is a non-profit organization that provides human blood for transfusion that operates locally and aims to collect 3000 units per day to ensure a safe and sufficient blood supply in the health care system. Recently, Nelson Mandela University endorsed the SANBS to host the first ever blood drive at Summerstrand Student Village on 24 March 2022.

It is not too late to make an impact on people's lives All healthcare institutions must have enough blood to fulfil the immediate needs of patients undergoing trauma and other life-saving treatments like blood transfusions.

You can visit your nearest blood centre to donate or if you would like more information. You must be aged between 16 and 75, weigh 50 kilograms or more, and lead a safe and healthy lifestyle.

Ama2000 also have a lot of influence through various platforms like word of mouth and social media.





PRINTERS – ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW

With the rise of digital technologies, it sometimes seems as if paper has become a thing of the past. Most students, however, still do a large portion of their studying and note-taking on paper. Many people find it easier to learn without the distraction of a screen. This means that inevitably, at some point, you will need to use a printer – be it for printing notes, copying diagrams, or scanning handwritten work.

A printer can seem like quite a daunting purchase – so many different models and features! Well, fear no more – below is your simplified guide to printers. Firstly, you may not even need a printer of your own! The printers on all Nelson Mandela University campuses, allow for black and white and colour printing, and are very cost-effective. They are situated in the computer labs and in the libraries. The only disadvantage is that you need to be on campus to print. If you do not need to print something often, this is the best option.

However, often you may need to print something quickly, and a printer of your own is then very useful. The most common type of printer for home use is an inkjet printer. This type of printer is small and works well for normal usage when needing to print a small number of pages. These printers generally take two cartridges – a black and a colour cartridge. The next type is a laser printer. This is the type of printer used in large offices. While it does allow for very cheap per-page costs, it is very pricey to purchase so it will not be a good option unless you need to print a lot of pages often.

So, if you are looking for a printer, inkjet printers are the way to go. Other features to look out for are wireless printing so that you can print without the hassle of a cable. Most new printers (except for entry-level ones) offer wireless printing. 

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THE END OF ANTIBIOTICS?

The end of an era in medicine is upon us, thanks to drug resistance in bacteria. It is said that globally, approximately 700 000 people die from drug-resistant diseases each year. Simultaneously, progress on new antibiotics has slowed to a halt, putting the world in jeopardy of a hazardous period in which routine illnesses are untreatable.


The cause of drug resistance is natural selection, where bacteria evolve genetic mutations to help them resist antibiotics and as a result have a higher chance of survival, reproduction and spreading.

The more antibiotics are taken, the more possibilities for drug resistance in bacteria to strengthen, which will ultimately lead to less effective antibiotics.

It is not only diseases like tuberculosis that will no longer be treatable but even sexually transmitted diseases are becoming increasingly difficult to treat – caesarean sections along with joint replacements are becoming more precarious to perform because the risk of infection rises.

At present, there is a bacteria that spreads through antibiotics by the name of 'C.difficile', and also a strain of gonorrhoea that is drug resistant, 'N.gonorrhoeae'.

These are two of the most serious current threats. It is essential that drastic changes be made with immediate effect or the 700 000 deaths related to drug resistant bacteria may climb to 10 million by the year 2050.



Phage therapy, where viruses are used in treating bacterial infections, holds great promise in curbing this problem.

Due to this therapy, methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus rates have decreased and the threat posed by vancomycin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus has passed, showing us that an investment into phage therapy might just be our second line of defence if antibiotics start falling out of favour.



ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE IN SOUTH AFRICA

Guillaume Chaslot, the founder of AlgoTransparency, describes the algorithm as a near-perfect clone of each user stored in the world's most powerful computers.

> This copy knows what video you're going to click on before you do, and each time you do choose a video, you are either confirming its knowledge of your mind or allowing it to tweak its understanding of what you like. The problem is, algorithms like YouTube's are designed to favour advertisers by increasing watch time, not help the user.

Against computing power far beyond our own brains, we stand little chance of fighting massive watch times and its harmful side-effects, like lack of productivity and internet addiction. AlgoTransparency knows the odds are against users and therefore want the algorithm itself to change. In the meantime, they have two tips for users: Unsubscribe from channels that waste your time, turn off your YouTube history, and turn off autoplay. Take your online habits back into your own hands.



Cyber fraud, financial exploitation, sexual harassment, stalking and doxing, are only some examples of the horrors that we, a society disconnected from reality, choose to turn a blind eye to in the hopes of finding our one true love.

The latest statistics indicate that in 2020 the number of online dating users hit nearly 300 million. Unfortunately, advertising yourself and your personal information is not a good idea on an app where lying is as easy as pushing a button. A recent study done on the safety of popular dating apps, found that 9% of users reported that their accounts were hacked, information they did not make public was stolen, and they were financially extorted.

When reviewing a number of these apps, including Tinder, Bumble, Hinge, OkCupid and Badoo, it was found that Tinder was unquestionably the best dating app currently out there. Safety features aside, an accurate algorithm is key when trying to find your perfect match, which is a feature severely lacking in many of the apps. Applications such as Badoo frequently ignores the set age and distance limits. Hinge allows people that you did not even match with to send you *unsolicited* messages, which is always less than ideal. All these factors make the hefty charges for a Tinder membership sound more and more manageable.

As more than 16% of users admitted to using the applications on work/personal devices that contained sensitive information, cyber safety when using dating apps must be taken more seriously.

A general rule of thumb, do not share information online that you would not share with a stranger, do not use a device containing sensitive information, do not connect your dating profile with your social media accounts or your phone number and be wary of the photos and the backgrounds of the photos you post. Always keep in mind that the person you are talking to may not be who their profile told you they were.

WANNA FIGHT? STUDY MATHS

When imagining a black belt-level martial artist, a student hunched over a textbook behind a desk probably doesn't come to mind. However, the mental acuity acquired while studying highly theoretical and abstract fields such as university Mathematics might just be what is needed to create a well-rounded fighter.

Here's how different academic topics can improve your combat:

- 1. Geometry: Strength, balance, and power in fights all come from a comprehensive knowledge of angles. In martial arts, the 'building' of specific structures with your arms and legs in response to different threats is referred to as framing. This concept is vital to all arts, from the position of the legs during boxing to the way you defend with your arms when an opponent is on top of you while grappling.
- 2. Physics: This one is simple. The greater the velocity of your punch, the faster your opponent is going to fall. Understanding momentum, power, and energy will put you a step ahead of a less knowledgeable adversary.
- 3. Biology: Martial arts is expressed through the movements of the body. Knowing how that body works and using that information can only benefit the fighter. Pain management can be made easier by studying the nervous system, muscle mass and flexibility can increase through science-based training routines, and through a tailored diet energy and recovery will be no-brainers. Besides the more obvious ones mentioned above, increasing the capabilities of your mind in general will enrich your marital arts training. Brazilian Jiu Jitsu, a hugely popular and useful grappling art, is often called "human chess" for a good reason. 
On the surface road kills may come across as an innocent mistake but if one were to take a deeper look, they would realize that roadkills are more detrimental than they

A 325–328-million-year-old fossil was discovered in Montana's Bear Gulch Limestone in 1988 and is the earliest-known ancestor of both the octopus and the vampire squid and kept in the Royal Ontario Museum in Canada. It was mostly disregarded for over 30 years until American palaeontologists Christopher Whalen and Neil Landman decided to explore it recently.

The discovered species' name is 'Syllipsimopodi bideni', named after President Joe Biden, in honour of his dedication to science, "according to the researchers". Syllipsimopodi bideni is a small, fossilized creature, approximately 12 cm long, with ten arms displaying suckers and fins and a long "torpedo-shaped" body like current squids. It's a one-of-kind discovery since "squishy" animals deteriorate quickly after death and rarely create good fossils. The most astonishing feature of this fossil may be its age. The discovery pushes the fossil record for vampyropods back by 82 million years.

According to the researchers, syllipsimopodi bideni is the oldest member of a group known as the vampyropods. Vampyropods are soft-bodied creature in the group of cephalopods, which include octopuses and vampire quid. Cephalopods are among the world's most diverse and fascinating molluscs. They have conquered every ocean, survived five mass extinctions, and now number approximately 800 species. Octopuses and squids are the most well-known cephalopods, but there are also cuttlefish, nautilus, extinct belemnites, and other cephalopods. Their economic and cultural value are enormous, and their ecological is crucial for ocean health.

As fascinating as this discovery is, most scientists, including Bruce Robison, strongly believe that there is still much more to be discovered in the deep ocean, such as new species and other deep-sea never been seen before phenomena.




